TECH TALK

This month Lisa offers quick LR Keyboard Shortcuts that speed up your workflow:

LIBRARY MODULE:

Remember these shortcut letters: G (grid) F (full screen) P (pick/flag) U (unpick/flag) C (compare) N (survey)

- Select an image and toggle between grid and full screen Press the Letter G (grid) or F (full screen)
- Press the Letter P to pick (flag/pick) an image Press the Letter U to remove the flag.
- Compare 2 photos select 2 images, press the Letter C to compare. Press the Letter G to return to Grid View.
- Compare more than 2 photos:
- -select consecutive photos click on one image, press the SHIFT key and then click on the last one or-
- -select non-consecutive photos hold the CMD (mac) or CTRL (windows) key and click one or more photos

After your selection, press the Letter N to compare selections. Press G to return to Grid View

DEVELOPMENT MODULE:

Press G to return to Grid View in the Library Module

Press D to return to Develop Module

Press \ to show before & after or Press Y to show before & after side by side photos

Press CMD (mac) CTRL (windows) and + or - to Zoom In or Zoom Out

Press K for the Adjustment Brush Tool

Press R for the Crop Tool

Meet Matt Siler ...

What do you shoot with?

My heart, my vision and my creativity when I can really tap into it. I'm not being flippant, I really mean this. You can read about my gear below but nothing is more important than your "vision". You have to learn about light and composition and train your eye to see what makes a scene an adequate image or a truly great photograph. I think if you have a well-formed idea for what you are trying to shoot and you can envision how to make it happen, then you are lightyears ahead of just showing up and taking pictures.

I think a little mental processing ahead of time also helps you manage expectations as well as plan for your day or week of shooting. To be frank, all pieces of gear you have are just tools. A camera, a bunch of lenses, a tripod, some filters, none of it will take or make your pictures for you. As the photographer, you become the architect as well as the builder rolled into one, taking your tools and creating something interesting, exciting, beautiful, and often meaningful. Use whatever gear you want and feels good in your hand, don't overextend your budget and then go practice, practice! Whatever brand of camera you have in your hand means very little unless you need specialized gear for a specific kind of shooting - like birds in flight or fast sports etc.

What is your favorite lens and why?

My favorite everyday do-it-all lens is currently my Olympus 12-100 f4 lens. Any similar expansive tele zoom is wonderful as far as I am concerned. It gives a shooter tremendous flexibility to create. This particular lens from Olympus is so incredibly versatile with its 24-200 full frame sensor focal length equivalent. When combined with the image stabilization of the Olympus Micro Four Thirds cameras you can take some amazing handheld images with little regard to your location and lighting, be it inside or out. It is small, light and optically superb (as are most of the Olympus M. Zuiko pro lenses). I have a similar lens on my Fuji X-T4 that I also love and though these super telephoto zooms tend not to be a master of any one thing they do most things well or very well and their relative compact size, versatility, stabilization and the fact that there is rarely a need to change lenses makes them ideal for everyday walkabout situations and especially for travel and street photography.

What do you like to shoot, and why?

My passion is really landscape photography though I like to dabble in just about anything with my camera. I even considered a career in pet photography at one time, shooting people and their pets. I love animals, it's the people I'm not so sure about. Making landscape images keeps me coming back because I love the travel aspect of this type of photography as well as being in the outdoors, often in remote and beautiful locations. I have always enjoyed traveling and I get to combine travel and photography along with my passion for being in the outside. Covid has been really hard on me and I have been challenged to stay motivated and creative while being unable to travel for the last two years. These quickly became my "go to" for anything even closely related to travel or fun and my Sony sat idle much of the time.

But Matt, you said three systems? I had a chance to go to Kenya the summer of 2019 and decided to make it a family friendly trip. Ten people, eight photographers my wife and my 17yr old daughter. I had a little freak out after reading more about safaris in Kenya and decided I did not want to lug my big Sony lenses around and was concerned the Olympus would underperform on the trip of a lifetime. I tell anyone and everyone who asks that if you really want to take great images, one of the best things you can do is to learn all about the equipment you already have. Read the manual, read an aftermarket guide, watch some videos, but make sure you know your gear inside and out and you will be ready for any situation.

I then made the biggest mistake anyone can make before a big trip and purchased a used Fuji X-T2 and a few lenses that I knew NOTHING about. I didn't know the details of the cameras focus system, or how it handled high ISO or the metering modes etc. I had a week before I left and learned as much as possible in a week and off we went. The trip was a smashing success and my Fuji's performed flawlessly. It was my hope that either the Fuji or the Olympus would reveal to me which system I preferred and I would quickly sell the other. Well, almost three years later I still have both the Olympus and Fuji Systems (and the Sony).

What have you learned in the last 6 months to a year, photographically, that has made all the difference? The main thing I have come to realize over the past year or so is that this thing we call photography is a slow process of growth, acceptance, understanding and learning. There is no single "thing" that I have learned "that has made all the difference". Instead, it is knowing that all the little things in the process matter and. like a jigsaw puzzle, all the pieces matter to varying degrees to different people. A photograph is something different to each person as is the process of making/creating photographs. An image can tell a story, teach us about history, show us a place to visit, share a moment in time, be a pretty picture or share raw emotional content. To every person who views or creates an image, it can be something different and no one person is "right" because photography, like art is different for everyone.
