

This month's member feature is ... Dan Comly!

What do you shoot with?

A Canon R6 and a Sony A6000

What is your favorite lens and why?

My Canon RF 24-240 zoom. It's got the full range of focal lengths for the work I like best.

What do you like to shoot, and why?

I like covering events, people doing things. I'm working on macro, nature, and landscape photography, but there's no escaping that my roots are in photojournalism.

What's in your camera bag?

First, any bag I carry will have two tubes of glucose tablets. I have type 1 diabetes which means that I'm susceptible to low blood sugar, so I carry these with me every time I'm out in the field. Beyond that, it depends which bag I'm carrying.

My big bag backpack has just about everything: R6 with 24-240mm lens; 15-30mm zoom; 100-400mm zoom; 35mm macro; 100mm macro; extension tubes; Nisi closeup lens kits; flash; flash bracket; cable release; remote wireless release; ND filters; tools; batteries for camera and flash; collapsible diffuser/reflector; bounce flash attachments; Platypod; cheap imitation Leatherman; Allen wrenches; maybe a tripod strapped to the bag.

My small bag typically has: R6 with 24-240mm; 15-30mm zoom; Godox flash; flash bracket; batteries; bounce flash attachments; flash bracket; Allen wrenches; maybe a monopod.

I have a tiny bag for my Sony gear: A6000 with 16-50mm; 35mm macro; 50-210mm zoom; polarizer and ND filters for the 16-50mm lens; LOTS of batteries (the A6000 has miserable battery life).

What have you learned in the last 6 months to a year, photographically, that has made all the difference?

In one of our club's lectures, the speaker taught me the mantra "What next?" That inspired me to move around more and work harder to find new and different viewpoints. Thanks to comments by judges in our competitions, I'm getting better at watching the light, backgrounds, and edges of the frame. This year I've started learning to both wait and anticipate. Wait for the clouds to pass, wait for the wind to die down. Watch what a subject is doing; if they do it once, they'll probably do it again. And if they don't do it again, quickly move on to the next subject.



PHOTOGRAPHY ADVENTURE: Lesser Known Slot Canyons of the SW!



Day 1 (Sat) – Arrive in St. George, Utah Either fly into St. George (SGU) or Las Vegas (LAS). If fly-ing into Las Vegas, we can arrange transfers on one of the hourly shuttles from Las Vegas to your arrival hotel in St. George. If you plan on driving here, arrangements can be made to keep your vehicle at the hotel. Abby Inn Best Western Inn Plus, St. George, UT

Day 2 (Sun) – St. George – Kodachrome Basin & Round Valley Draw

The arch was initially the symbol for the Grand Staticase Escalante National Monument when it was first formed. Next up, we explore Cosety Round Valley Draw, our first slot campon. This slot canyon offering beautiful sandstone formations and



the opportunity to see the start of Hackberry Cany which is a backpacker's wilderness.

We'll then head to our hotel in Bryce Canyon City. After dinner, there will be a private astronomy program for the group where you will learn about the stars you will be seeing for the rest of the week!

Day 3 (Mon) - Willis Creek & Bull Valley Slot Canyons

This morning, we explore Willis Creek Slot Canyon which is a "user friendly" slot canyon and is a great way which is a "user friendly" slot canyon and is a great way to break you into what you'll be experiencing over the next several days. Along the way, there are a few wa-terfalls where you can experience seeing a slot canyon being formed by Mother Nature. We'll walk down Wills Creek, which usually is a few inches deep with water and a foot or two wide, for about two miles or more and a return back to the trailhead.

We then continue down the road a few more miles so that you can experience **Bull Valley Gorge**, which is a bit more sinister-looking than Willis Creek. You'll see where an automobile from the 1950s is part of the road where an automobile from the 1950s is part of the road bridge over the gorge. Well descend into this deep, dark and ominous slot canyon and explore its bowels for a few miles while we negotate the chockstones that have been moved here during many flashflood events over thousands of years. Total hiking distance for both slot canyons will be about 4 to 6 miles.

After we spend the day exploring these two slot can-yons, we'll head over to the town of **Escalante**, which is about an hour away.

Day 4 (Tue) – Escalante Canyo Arches & Natural Bridges

After traveling to the Escalante Canyons region of the national monument, you'll hike up Escalante Canyon to two unique formations. First will be the Escalante Naton to two unique formations. First will be the Escalarie Nat-ural Bridge. This is perched at the top of the cliffs that border the Escalarie River. A short distance further well take a look at Cliff House Arch and the small Native American ruins beneath it. After a picnic lunch, you'll hike down Escalance Canyon to Phillips Arch. Afterwards you will continue down-canyon and hike up to Bowing-ton Arch before returning back to the trailhead. If we have enough time left ower, from the trailhead parking area, well clinhu ga ferv ledges to view the very rare and unusual Native American pictograph site called 100 Hands.

Hands: Hiking today will include many water crossings. Come prepared with appropriate footwear that can get wet without giving your feet bilsters. Before your tour, we can help you find the perfect footwear solution. Contact us in encough time before your departure date. Once finished with the hikes, you will return to Escalante for the evening. The distance of the series of hikes today can be up to a total of about 10 miles, depending on the group's abilities and desires, but hiking portions can be eliminated to reduce the distance.

Day 5 (Wed) – Hole in the Rock Road Sites & Slots

Today you'll explore and experience sites along one of the monument's well-known roads that was named and made famous by Mormon Pioneers that trailblazed this road to settle regions in southeast Utah and Arizona - Hole in the Rock Road. Our stops and hikes include:

- Covered Wagon Natural Bridge, a series of unique and large natural bridges that you'll walk under, Nearby Cedar Wash Arch, which is located inside a beautifully sculptured canyon; Devils Garden, containing some not-so demonic
- Devil's Garden, containing some not-so demonic sandstone hoodoos and arches; st; with its se-ries of footprints and tracks left behind by two differ-ent prehistoric animals during the Jurassic Period; And finality, a series of solt carryons situated close by including Dry Fork Goyote Gulch, famed Peek-a-Boo Slot Camyon and Spooly Gulch.

The total hiking distance around these slot canyons and the other sites will be 3 to 5 miles. We'll return to Escalante again for the evening.

Day 6 (Thu) – Calf Creek Falls

Day 6 (Thu) - Calf Creek Falls Lower Calf Creek Falls may be the crowing level of the monument and you'll see why. Since parking at the trailheed fills up quickly, this morning will be an early start at 7am. This iconic hike meanders through 7 miles of lush caryon scenery with colorful walls and a flowing stream in the middle. Along the way, you'll see some more pictographs, these being almost the size of a per-son. Be sure to look into the river for trut, which may or may not be on the menu tonight.

After the 6 mile roundtrip hike, it's time for a hearty meal at the unique **Kiva Koffeehouse**, which is perched above the lush **Escalante Caryon** we hiked through a few days ago. We'll enjoy lunch enjoying the views and building
